After graduating from the Josef Korbel School I moved to Morogoro, Tanzania for a year as a <u>Global Health Corps</u> Fellow and worked with the <u>Southern African Centre for Infectious Disease Surveillance</u>, (SACIDS). Having had several opportunities to live and work in Africa, both while at the Josef Korbel School and afterwards, I knew I wanted to pursue a research career and decided to return to school for my doctorate. Currently I'm working on my PhD in Epidemiology at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. My research interests are in improving reproductive and maternal health outcomes for women in the developing world.

Why did you choose the Josef Korbel School?

When I was researching master's degree programs I was torn between pursuing public health and international development. With the Korbel School's programs in <u>International Development</u> and <u>Global Health Affairs</u> I found I didn't have to choose between the two. I was able to take coursework, work on projects and do an internship specific to global health issues, but I was able to learn about global health within the larger context of international development. For me, it was a great fit.
