The BA program in International Studies offers undergraduate students at the University of Denver critical knowledge and skills for succeeding in a world that has gone global. Understanding how global institutions and exchanges work and bringing an international perspective to one's professional development is a necessity for modern life. DU's International Studies curriculum gives students this foundation. Join us to learn how you can act as an agent of change for global good.

Curriculum Overview: Candidates must complete 44 credit hours.

All courses must be completed with a C- or better in order to count towards and satisfy requirements for the major.

Students must take at least 12 credits/3 courses at the 3000 level between their specialization and their supporting courses.

3000 level skills, while encouraged if of interest to the student, do not count for this requirement.

3. Specialization – 12 Credits

Students take 3 classes (12 credits) from within one of the five standing specializations listed below or they build a unique one (e.g. Middle Eastern Studies) with advisor approval. The pre-designed and scheduled specializations are subject to change as new courses are developed:

Global Governance and Human Rights (GGR)

Global Environmental Sustainability (GES)

Global Peace and Security (GPS)

The Politics of the Global Economy (PGE)

Technology and Global Affairs (TGA)

4. Electives – 16 Credits of INTS approved courses outside of the student's specialization
